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## Parking at School

## THE YARE EDUCATION TRUST - FACILITIES MANAGEMENT

One of the key roles of the Trust is to support schools with their facilities management. Headteachers identified this as a responsibility where the Trust could take on key aspects, freeing time to allow Headteachers to focus more on teaching and learning.

As the Trust has grown in size, we now receive a grant from the DfE for capital work. The Trustees use our school audits of facilities to allocate spending.

Currently the Trust Facilities Manager is working on the following projects with schools:

- Roofing at Hemblington and North Walsham Infant and Nursery
- Window replacement at Thorpe St Andrew School and Sixth Form
- Outside corridor access at Hillside Avenue
- Playgroup licensing and development along with fire and electrical testing at Dussindale

The Trust is also managing projects for schools which include:

- Boiler and heating condition surveys
- Health and safety implementation

and a range of other facilities related policies and procedures.

And finally, the Trust has led work in setting up contracts for Trust schools on catering, cleaning, ground maintenance and Broadband. By collectively negotiating these types of contract, savings can be made which go back into teaching and learning.

All of these activities are managed with each school's Local Governing Boards, ensuring key discussions are taken based upon local needs and issues.

## Bursary – Reminder

The 16-19 Bursary Fund is a Government scheme set up to financially support those students who face significant financial barriers to continue in education Post-16.

There are two different funds which are available to students. They are:

### Mandatory Bursary

This Bursary is for those students who face the most serious financial barriers and are considered the most vulnerable. Students who fall into the following categories will qualify and be eligible to receive a bursary of up to **£1,200 a year**:

A young person in care, a care leaver, a young person in receipt of Income Support or Universal Credit in their own name, a disabled learner in receipt of Employment and Support Allowance/or Universal Credit and Disability Living Allowance/or Personal Independence Payments.

### Discretionary Bursary

Eligibility for the Discretionary Bursary takes into account various aspects of family income and evidence of this will be required to process applications. For the 2019-2020 academic year the threshold of household income to be eligible is up to **£25,000 per annum or less**.
