Spring Half Term	World Music – If I were a teenager in another country what would I listen to? This terms work explores the popular music from different cultures and relates it back to our own experiences of music.	This terms work aims to make musical connections between our cultures and the cultures of young people around the world. Western popular music has spread around the world but each culture has interpreted it differently. We can get to know more about ourselves by seeing what parts of our culture has been adopted by others.	Students explore the musical traditions and popular music of regions around the world. The students learn about different musical instruments, how they are used and what they represent in different cultures. Students experiment with creating popular music that fuses elements from different cultures.	Lists of wider listening opportunities will be published.
Summer Half Term	Bringing it all together – students work together to recreate a song of their choice. They arrange their chosen music to suit their group. The students then record their work using our recording studio.	The music industry contributes £3bn a year to the U.K. economy. This term's works starts to help students understand the different roles within the wider music industry beyond that of a performer. Students practice the core skills of confidence, cooperation and dedication that makes up a successful musician.	Students work through the term to improve their instrumental and vocal skills and regularly review their progress. Students are encouraged to record themselves performing and to be honest about their progress. In the final weeks of term students use our recording equipment to make a record of what they are able to do.	Bringing it all together – students work together to recreate a song of their choice.
