We live in a diverse society. Thorpe St Andrew School and Sixth Form is a diverse school, with students and staff representing cultures from all around the World. An important part of our children's education is the encounters they have with the different communities that are represented in school. Students who do not come in to school miss out on these encounters and risk being less familiar with the diversity that awaits them when they leave school.

We explored online learning platforms such as Seneca and MyMaths and how they support revision. Parents and students worked alongside each other to plan out a revision schedule and to practice using flashcards. Parents and Carers took the role of Quizmaster during the session to support their child in active revision.

Flashcards help students to engage in active recall or a process wherein students actively engage in learning by stimulating memories and creating lasting connections to the material. When students create flashcards, they should incorporate images as well as words to help improve their active recall.

Using flashcards is an extremely effective strategy in order to consolidate the key knowledge needed for examinations. However, we know from research that we are more likely to retain information the more times we are exposed to that new information. Therefore, as a school we recommend the Lietner method to improve our use of flashcards, you can find out more about this method in this short presentation here.

Revision does not begin in Year 11 or Year 13, but throughout their time with us, students at Thorpe St Andrew School and Sixth Form are taught how to effectively engage with Key Knowledge Sheets in order to become successful independent learners. Year 7 - 9 students have been taught how to use Look, Cover, Write, Check as a revision tool and later this term they will also complete an activity on how to use flashcards in order to further develop their revision skills.

EXAMS are coming!!! **PPEs are coming** ... Completion of past papers before the knowledge has been learnt is not recommended as the examination papers are designed to assess the application of knowledge across the course

Safeguarding Focus - With Holocaust Memorial Day at the end of the month, it is important to take time to reflect on some of the individual stories that come out of that horrific time in history. In our Monday Assembly, our Safeguarding Focus was on the 1946 poem by Martin Niemoller, and the challenge it poses to us all to speak out on behalf of the persecuted.

Failing to speak out about injustice and persecution, whether it is in school, in Norfolk, the UK or the wider world is to condone that behaviour. Organisations like *Amnesty International* highlight the stories of persecuted people around the world and encourage us to support them by taking part in letter writing campaigns.



At school we are encouraging students to speak out about bullying and prejudice that they witness. Every allegation that we receive is investigated and acted upon. Perpetrators are helped to understand that their behaviour is wrong and unacceptable. Targeted students are supported. Together, we can make Thorpe a more inclusive, tolerant community.

We are aware that the COVID-19 Pandemic may have caused some parents to feel less confident with assessing whether their child is well enough to be in school so the Chief Medical Officer (Professor Chris Whitty) along with health professionals in the NHS have laid out some information which they hope you will find helpful. There is a wide agreement among health and educational professionals that school attendance is vital to the life chances of children and young people.

Being in school improves health, well-being and socialisation throughout the life course. The greatest benefits come from children and young people attending school regularly. It is usually appropriate for Parents and Carers to send their children to school with mild respiratory illnesses. This would include general cold symptoms; a minor cough, runny nose or sore throat.
