The Attendance Theme for 2023-4- Opportunity



The Impact of Absence



We've shown this graph at some of our "Working Together" Evenings. It shows the impact of absence on GCSE performance.

We regard any student who's attendance is below 90% as being *Persistently Absent*. By the end of the School Year, they will have missed 20 or more days of school. The impact of this is stark... only 35% of students who had an attendance rate between 85 and 90% managed to secure 5 passes at GCSE. The chances of securing those life-changing grades grows with improved attendance.
